#### i) 2016/2017 Facility Use, Program and Services Fee Schedule

Giro di Burnaby 2016 comprises a single cycling event, the Criterium, open to male and female cyclists competing for a total prize purse of over \$15,000, which is paid to the racers from monies collected from sponsorship. The race consists of 30 laps of the 1.2 km course for the female riders and 45 laps for the male riders.

Dear Members of the Parks Recreation and Culture Commission,

I am writing to seek the City of Burnaby's support for a worthy cause that provides assistance to military personnel, first responders, veterans and their families in times of need.

By way of background, in November 2012, <u>Constable Adrian Oliver</u>, a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, was killed in the line of duty in Surrey, BC. Adrian is my identical twin brother and I am also a serving member of the Burnaby RCMP. In the difficult days that followed his death, <u>Honour House</u> opened its doors to my family as they travelled to the Vancouver area from across Canada to be with family and friends.

In November 2013, in partnership with Honour House Society and Burnaby RCMP,

Adrian's family and friends organized the first Adrian Oliver Memorial Run in recognition of his dedicated service and to commemorate and honour all first responders who perished in the line of duty.

Due to its success, the <u>Adrian Oliver Memorial Run</u> has now become an annual event. All proceeds from the memorial run are donated to <u>Honour House Society</u> – a non-profit charitable organization located in the heart of New Westminster, BC (CRA Registration Number: 842367294RR0001). Honour House provides a "home away from home" and a place of recovery specifically for military personnel and first

responders while they are receiving medical care or coping with a sudden tragedy. Honour House depends entirely on donations to allow it to continue providing essential services to Canadian heroes and their families throughout British Columbia. To date, the memorial run has raised over \$60,000 for this important charity.

On November 13<sup>th</sup>, 2016, the fourth annual Adrian Oliver Memorial Run will be held at at the Shadbolt Centre and Deer Lake Park in Burnaby, BC. The run is open to first responders, the general public and surrounding communities. To promote camaraderie and esprit de corps, first responder organizations are encouraged to register a team to compete for a prestigious trophy. Once again, 100% of the proceeds generated from the memorial run will be used to support Honour House and its important mission.

Due to the charitable nature of the event, we are requesting the support of the City of Burnaby by means of having the reservation fees for Deer Lake Park and Shadbolt Centre partially or fully waived.

Promotion and advertising of this year's run is already underway through social media, community bulletins and our website. All contributions will be acknowledged on the Adrian Oliver Memorial Run website. Donations valued at \$500 or above will be displayed on our run billboard on the day of the event. Donations valued at \$1000 or more will be acknowledged on both our billboard and run t-shirts.

The City of Burnaby's support could be important in expanding Honour House's vision to other regions and maintaining a living memorial to military personnel and first responders – past, present and future. 



#### REPORT

#### 1.0 BACKGROUND

Bonsor Pool was constructed in 1973, with the Bonsor Recreation Centre added in 1988 to serve the growing population in the Metrotown area. The facility houses a wide variety of community programs, including swimming, gymnasium sports, racquetball, weight training, fine arts, yoga, dance, fitness and more. The facility has undertaken two renovation projects: conversion of a restaurant into a cardio space, and the conversion of two racquetball courts into a yoga studio and multi-purpose room. These spaces are currently well-utilized.

In 2013, the Bonsor 55+ Society was relocated from the upper floor of the Bonsor Recreation Complex to the new Bonsor 55+ Centre on Bennett Street. This relocation vacated 3,340 sq. ft. of space on the upper floor of the Bonsor Recreation Centre. At its 2014 March 10 Open meeting, City Council approved the expenditure of \$1,300,000 (inclusive of taxes) from Density Bonus funds to finance the renovation of the Bonsor upper floor area previously occupied by the Society. This space will be renovated to

meet several unmet needs at Bonsor by providing a 2000 sq. ft. multi-purpose room for fitness, social and dance activities; an 800 sq. ft. spin cycle studio and personal training area; two music studios of approximately 100 sq. ft. each; and circulation space for patrons using the new rooms.

A public consultation process was undertaken with existing patrons of Bonsor Recreation Complex. The feedback that was received was positive and supported the direction that is being taken. In particular, there was resounding support for the spin cycling studio as it adds a new dimension to the fitness services currently being offered at Bonsor Recreation Complex. The proposed renovated space is estimated to serve an additional 2,000 participants per week, or approximately 100,000 per year.

At the completion of the public consultation process, the City retained Shape Architecture Inc. to determine space allocation and to develop a design to deliver the proposed programs.

Since the original funding approval, the project has been delayed by higher than expected project bids in fall of 2014 and an unsuccessful attempt to secure Federal grant funding as a Canada 150 project in spring of 2015. Currently, the renovation of the vacated senior's space is considered an opportunity to provide a cosmetic upgrade to the remainder of the upper floor at the Bonsor Recreation Complex. This would be the first upgrade to the upper floor spaces since original construction and will carry this area of the facility to the end of its useful life.

The proposed additional cosmetic upgrades include sanding of existing banquet hall wood flooring, painting walls, replacing aged ceiling tiles, replacement flooring in select areas, and other cosmetic upgrades. The renovations to the remainder of the upper floor do not include any reconfiguration of the spaces or any major electrical or mechanical upgrades.

Upon finalization of the drawings and contract documents, the project will be ready for tender, with the results of the tender to be reported to the Committee and Council in a future report.

## 2.0 PROJECT BUDGET AND FINANCING

The following is a cost summary for the Renovation Project which is comprised of estimated construction values, consulting services and various related project costs.

These funds are identified in the 2016 Provisional Capital Budget. Council have previously approved \$1.3 million for this project through Bonus Density funding. It is recommended that rather than finance the new costs through Capital Reserves Bylaw, Council be requested to authorize the use of Community Amenity funding in the amount of \$1,280,000 to finance the balance of this project.

#### 3.0 CONCLUSION

The detailed design is nearing completion and in order to proceed to tender, funding will be required. In this regard it is recommended that Council approve Community Amenity funding in the amount of \$1,280,000 (inclusive of taxes) for the expanded scope of this construction project. Subject to receiving funding approval staff will complete the tender documents and proceed to tender.

It is recommended that a copy of this report be sent to the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission for information.

#### REPORT

#### 1.0 BACKGROUND

The City currently provides ice arena services from three public arenas. They include:

Bill Copeland Arena

Constructed in 1997

Kensington Arena

Constructed in 1973

Burnaby Lake Arena

Constructed in 1964

Arising from a needs assessment undertaken by the Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services Department, it was determined that additional ice rink capacity beyond the existing publicly-owned rink facilities was needed to serve current and future Burnaby residents, teams and clubs.

To meet this need, in 2014 Council adopted a report reviewing the City's Community Benefit Bonus Policy, which identified the use of amenity bonus funds towards priority amenity projects for the City, including a new ice rink facility, to serve south Burnaby. In response to this direction, in the summer of 2015, Planning and Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services staff undertook a review of City-owned lands in South Burnaby that could accommodate one or two ice rinks.

Among the several City-owned properties that could accommodate such a facility, three were identified as appropriate due to their size, configuration, location and access. These three potential locations included Bonsor Park, MacPherson Park West and City-owned properties at 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 18<sup>th</sup> Street. In 2015 August, after a review of these potential locations with Councillors and Parks Commissioners, it was determined that the 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 18<sup>th</sup> Street site would be the most suitable as it would not impact existing or proposed park facilities, is of a suitable size to accommodate two ice rinks, and is accessible by for the community by walking, cycling, driving and transit.

#### 2.0 PREFERRED SITE

The preferred site at 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 18<sup>th</sup> Street is located within the Council-adopted Edmonds Town Centre Plan area. The site is made up of two parcels at 7789 and 7799 -18<sup>th</sup> Street, which have a combined frontage on 18<sup>th</sup> Street of approximately 210m (689 ft.), and an area of approximately 16,560m<sup>2</sup> (4.09 acres). Directly to the west and northwest is Byrne Creek Secondary School. To the northeast across 18<sup>th</sup> Street is the proposed Southgate Neighbourhood, which will accommodate a new 2.02 hectare (5 acre) City park surrounded by multiple-family and mixed-use development. To the Southeast across 18<sup>th</sup> Street are existing institutional (Church) and single and two family uses. To the south across 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue is the City of New Westminster, with single and two family uses fronting 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue. The preferred site is highly accessible to south Burnaby residents via Griffiths Drive, Southridge Drive and 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue. Bus access to the site is available via the 116 Edmonds Station / Metrotown Station and 112 Edmonds Station / New Westminster Station. The site is located approximately 950m (3,116 ft.) walking distance from the Edmonds SkyTrain Station and is connected to the Urban Trail network in the area.

A rezoning from the prevailing M1 Manufacturing District to the CD Comprehensive Development District (utilizing the P2 Administration and Assembly District) would be required to permit the proposed ice rink facility. The site would be required to be consolidated by way of a Subdivision Application and serviced based on Town Centre Standards with separated sidewalk and cycling facilities on 18<sup>th</sup> Street and 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue, and provided with all necessary utilities to serve the site. Preliminary Plan Approval and Building Permit will be required to permit construction of the proposed facility.

#### 3.0 PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT

In order to advance the ice arena project forward, it is recommended that a comprehensive Feasibility Study be undertaken for the preferred site. The Study will examine the service needs and facility requirements to provide both dry floor space and ice surface for the community. It will also help establish a building program which will not only include the ice rink(s) but other amenities such as public meeting space, bulk storage, limited seating and a snack bar component.

In addition, the Study will examine siting options for possible future expansion, parking, site servicing, and public amenities that could be located on a second level of the proposed facility.

The Feasibility Study report will also provide a preferred concept design of the proposed ice rink facility and estimated project costs for the various phases of the project from concept design through to the construction phase.

#### 4.0 CONCLUSION

It is recommended that Council be requested to authorize the issuance of a Request for Proposal (RFP) to retain a consulting firm to undertake a comprehensive feasibility study to examine the feasibility of developing an arena facility on the preferred City-owned site at 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 18<sup>th</sup> Street in South Burnaby, as outlined in this report.

Council approved bylaw funding of \$250,000 on 2015 October 26 to undertake the feasibility study. In addition, the approved 2017 – 2018 Capital Plan identifies \$22 million for construction of the proposed facility drawing on the Community Benefit Fund.

#### **REPORT**

Commission and Council, have approved fees and charges for recreation and cultural services on April 20<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> respectively, for the admissions, rentals and program fees for 2016/2017. Subsequent to these approvals two updates are recommended for the outdoor pool rental and student filming in City parks.

#### **Outdoor Pool Rental Rates**

At the 2016 April 20 Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission meeting, Laura Marquez, President of Burnaby Barracudas Swim Club appeared as a delegation. In her presentation, Ms. Marquez spoke of the current status of her club, the challenges they face as a community based youth aquatics association and their plans for the future. Included was a request for a review of outdoor pool rental rates for Burnaby swim clubs.

A review has been conducted for outdoor pool rental fees for non-profit youth oriented summer swim clubs, in neighboring municipalities (<u>Attachment #1</u>). The average rate is \$29.11 per hour. The lowest rate was noted in Port Moody at \$10.61per hour (for the facility only) and the highest rate was Burnaby's rate at \$75.45 per hour which includes staffing. It is difficult to compare outdoor pool rates as each pool is different and the majority of pools do not provide staffing. Burnaby has the most outdoor pools used by

swim clubs in the lower mainland and provides staffing to ensure the water quality is maintained, the chlorine gas based facilities are operated safely and our many user groups follow appropriate standards.

This fee review indicates that a fee adjustment for outdoor pool rental rates for Burnaby aquatic clubs is supportable to align with regional rates. It is therefore recommended that the following rates be added to the Fees and Charges Bylaw.

- 1. Preferred Youth Aquatic allotment rate of \$57.83 for Central Park Pool and \$49.96 for Robert Burnaby, Kensington and MacPherson (<u>Attachment #2</u>).
- 2. Preferred Youth Aquatic Competition (plus staff costs) \$57.83 for Central Park Pool.

The resulting estimated budget adjustment of approximately \$18,100 will be managed internally through operational efficiencies. This reflects the median rate plus one staff.

# **Student Filming in Parks**

The previously approved bylaw fees included a \$50 charge for Filming (Film Students) for Movie Filming – Outdoor Parks and for Commercials/Photography – Outdoor Parks. This is an error and should read "No charge" for both categories. It is recommended the bylaw be updated to reflect no charge (<u>Attachment #3</u>).

If approved, these updates will be consolidated with those fees previously approved for bylaw approval.

#### **REPORT**

Appearing under correspondence is a letter from Mr. Ben Oliver, Chair, Adrian Oliver Memorial Run, a charitable fundraising event for the Honour House Society. Mr. Oliver is requesting a fee waiver for the use of Deer Lake Park and the Shadbolt Centre for the event on 2016 November 13.

Based in New Westminster, B.C., the organization provides assistance to military personnel, first responders, veterans and their families in times of need. Dependent on donations, Honour House provides a place for recovery for military personnel and first responders who are receiving medical care or coping with sudden tragedy.

The group has requested a fee waiver totalling \$1,519.24. This fee includes the use of the Shadbolt Centre East Plaza and Studios 100/101 (\$1,321.74) and Deer Lake Park (\$197.50). Allotment fees are in place to offset a portion of operating costs for spaces and facilities for fund raising and charitable events such as this one. Commission has put in place preferred rates for non-profit societies for this purpose.

#### **REPORT**

The City of Burnaby and School District 41 have been working together since 1974 to provide services to the citizens of Burnaby. Burnaby's Community Schools fill a valuable role in their communities by providing meeting and program space and services during out of school times to local residents. This relationship and funding allows the following to be achieved:

- Optimise the use of school facilities
- Enrich the K-12 program by making the resources of the community more available
- Provide a delivery system for activities
- Becoming more responsive to citizen needs and desires

Burnaby's eight Community Schools provide an additional layer of recreation and community services to the citizens of Burnaby. Community schools welcome parents and the community into their facilities with community rooms available over extended hours; before, during and after school programing; and special events. With these extended hours and programs these schools have become hubs in their communities.

The District Community School Advisory and Coordinating Committee (DCSACC) membership consists of parent representatives from each community school, one School Trustee, one Commission member, one Council member and one member at large. At its meeting of 2016 April 14, DCSACC approved the 2016/2017 Community School budget and requested that the School District and the City of Burnaby provide the funds for the continued operation of the eight Community Schools for the upcoming school year.

A letter from the Burnaby School District #41 (<u>Attachment #1</u>) includes the request and outlines the Community Schools' operating budget and funding sources for the upcoming year. The budget provides for a \$4,267.00 increase to overall base contribution levels from the base contribution levels from the City and School District to address projected increases for employee benefits and inflation for supplies and services for 2016/2017. This funding is distributed equally to each school and covers the core funding requirements. All community schools supplement their community education programs and neighbourhood activities through a variety of fund raising activities, grants, donations and sponsorships.

It is recommended that approval be given for the expenditure of \$464,923 as the City's share of the funds to operate Burnaby's community schools. The funds are included in the City's Annual Budget.

# 2016/2017 COMMUNITY SCHOOL OPERATING BUDGET INFORMATION


The community school program in Burnaby is supported by an integrated funding model involving the school district, City of Burnaby, provincial government, organizations and community residents.

The City of Burnaby and the school district have an operating agreement which outlines the process for receiving community school designation status and a funding formula to support community school operations.

The provincial government through the Ministry of Education's CommunityLINK funding provides the school district with the funds to support a number of school based social service programs such as school meals, children, youth and family support services and community schools. Many of these services are integral elements of the district's community school model.

The community school budget merges the school district financial year (school year July 1- June 30) with the city (calendar year January 1- December 31) to produce an 18 month budget cycle. It is further complicated by the provincial government's budget year (April 1- March 31). The budget that is being proposed is for the 2016/2017 school year (July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017).

The following graphic may be helpful in understanding how the funding partnership works:



#### 2016/2017 Budget Preparation Guiding Principles

- Budget includes provision for a \$10,942 increase to overall base contribution levels from the City and School District to address projected increases for employee wages and benefits for 2016/2017
- Budget provides for an equitable distribution of funds to each designated community school
- Budget recognizes that each community school enhances their community education program through a variety of other funding sources including provincial and federal government summer program grants
- Budget uses the historical community school cost sharing agreement to determine the level funding required from the City of Burnaby and the School District for the operation of the community school programs for 2016/2017
- Requests the City increase its contribution by \$4,267 from \$460,656 to \$464,923 to cover its share of the overall cost of providing the existing community schools program in 2016/2017
- Requests the School District increase its contribution by \$6,674 from \$728,054 to \$734,728 to cover its share of the overall cost of providing the existing community schools program in 2016/2017
