SUBJECT:

SOLID WASTE & RECYLING BYLAW 12875 – RATE CHANGES

PURPOSE:

To seek Council's approval to revise the Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 12875

effective 2016 August 01, to reflect rate increases and provision for Secondary

Suite Minimum Garbage Fee and MMBC glass recycling guidelines.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. THAT the Committee recommend Council authorize staff to amend the Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 12875 as outlined in Section 2 of this report.

REPORT

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Staff have reviewed the Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 12875 and have identified a need to reflect upcoming changes to the operational program as well as to provide some clarity on wording in the Bylaw. Changes in rates are also included to reflect introduction of the Secondary Suite program for residential properties.

2.0 AMENDMENTS TO THE SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING BYLAW

Secondary Suite Garbage Fee

In 2014, Council adopted a program to permit secondary suites in single-family homes. This program is in response to recommendations from within Burnaby's Official Community Plan and Social Sustainability Strategy. As a part of this program, all properties with a secondary suite are subject to additional user fees to cover the additional cost for providing Water and Sewer services. In addition, an amendment is required to incorporate a minimum **Secondary Suite Garbage Fee** of 240 Litres. The 2016 annual fee for 240L is \$205. This charge will be applied to all residential dwellings with a secondary suite, even if the toter in use may be smaller than 240 Litres.

Secondary Suite Garbage Fees will be billed annually with Water and Sewer charges on the Utility Charges and Garbage Disposal Fees notice. For newly constructed properties with secondary suites, or those that have been demolished and rebuilt with a secondary suite, secondary suite garbage fees will have the same effective date as the annual supplementary flat water service fee.

Other rates proposed to be increased include:

- Multi-family Commercial and Institutional garbage and recycling receptacle rental and pickup: 5% increase in rates to recover the costs of services and other increases since the last fee adjustment in 2012.
- Multi-family, Commercial and Institutional yard waste rental containers: \$5 monthly rental fee increase for three (3) and four (4) cubic yard containers with castors. Castors normally need to be replaced every other year and this replacement cost has steadily increased over the years.
- Yard Waste Drop-Off at City's Eco-Centre: Increase in drop off fee from \$65/tonne to \$67/tonne (inclusive of applicable taxes) to reflect and bring it to par with regional rates. There is no fee for Burnaby residents with a load < 100kg.</p>

Table 1 (see <u>Attachment #1</u>) summarizes the proposed fees increases for the Burnaby Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 12875.

In addition, the Burnaby Solid Waste & Recycling Bylaw 12875 to be updated to reflect MMBC glass recycling guidelines. Wording throughout the bylaw will be updated to provide further clarity.

3.0 CONCLUSION

Staff have reviewed the Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 12875 to accommodate the changes noted above and the rates as set out in *Attachment* #1. Staff are recommending that Financial Management Committee recommend Council authorize the preparation of the bylaw to amend the Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 12875 as outlined in Section 2 of this report.

REPORT

The 2016 – 2020 Annual Financial Plan provides funding for various multi-year capital improvements. In order to proceed in a timely manner with the contracts for design and construction, funding approval is requested for the projects listed below. Sufficient Capital Reserves are available to complete these works.

Provisional funding was previously requested in December 2015 for Traffic Management infrastructure. This additional funding was included in the Annual Plan in order to complete additional work in this area.

1.0 2016 Capital Program

For capital programs that have plan in both 2016 and 2017, the funding for both years is being raised here in order to be able to award contracts for construction.

Re: 2016 Engineering Capital Infrastructure Traffic Management Bylaw

Funding Request

1.1 Ticketing System Upgrade

(EMF.0055)

\$41,000

The City's current handheld ticketing equipment is failing and is no longer supported by the vendor. Therefore, new handheld units along with new handheld printers are now required to maintain and enhance system operations. This includes all necessary software upgrades for complete integration with the T2 system. Additionally, the equipment related to License Plate Recognition (LPR) will be relocated to a different vehicle.

1.2 Curb Bulges/ Traffic Calming

(EMI.0001)

\$60,000

The Traffic Calming project provide for the provision of various traffic control devices including new corner bulges, and the replacement of old interim traffic calming barriers with permanent final standard infrastructure.

1.3 2016 Streetlight Pole Replacement LRN

(EMH.0013)

\$140,000

The City has an annual program for replacement of LRN streetlight poles.

1.4 2016 Streetlight Pole Replacement MRN

(EMH.0014)

\$30,000

The City has an annual program for replacement of MRN streetlight poles.

1.5 2017 LED Streetlight Conversion

(EMH.0015)

\$1,800,000

Funding for the installation of LED streetlight fixtures to replace the existing HPS fixtures in the southwest quadrant of the City is required. The new fixtures are more energy efficient and last much longer than existing fixtures. Although the capital cost of the LED fixtures is more expensive, the energy and maintenance savings is estimated to provide a payback in about 6 years assuming increasing electricity costs and BC Hydro rebates. The updated estimate for the work to be completed in 2017 is \$1.8M. To carry out this program as planned, an additional \$100k of funding over the planned amount (\$1.7M) is required; therefore \$100K from the 2018 Capital Plan is being moved to the 2017 Capital Plan. 2017 funding is being requested now to allow for materials to be purchased and in place to begin work 2017 January 01.

To request funding approval for 2016 Engineering Vehicles - Annual.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. THAT Council approve the capital expenditure of \$962,000 for vehicle acquisitions, as outlined in this report.

2. THAT Council authorize staff to bring down a Capital Reserve Bylaw in the amount of \$1,007,000 (inclusive of GST), to finance the capital programs as outlined in this report.

REPORT

The 2016 – 2020 Annual Financial Plan provides funding for various multi-year capital improvements. In order to proceed in a timely manner with the specifications and ordering of vehicles, funding approval is requested for the projects listed below. Sufficient Capital Reserves are available to complete these works.

Provisional funding was previously requested in December 2015 for new vehicles. This additional funding was included in the Annual Plan in order to purchase additional vehicles.

1.0 New Vehicles Engineering Fleet

1.1 Backhoes

(ENZ.0036)

\$300,000

Water and Sewer rely on several contracted backhoes daily to assist City forces in completing construction and maintenance programs. There are two spare backhoes to the 4 RFT boarded operators for Public Works that are predominately used daily for Water and Sewer construction and operating programs. They currently use spare backhoes from the fleet inventory that are meant to be used infrequently.

Re: 2016 Engineering Capital Infrastructure Vehicle Acquisition Annual

1.2 Tandem Axle Dump Trucks (ENZ.0036)

\$650,000

The City retains approximately 12 contracted Tandem Dump Trucks through Hired Equipment Services to assist City forces in completing construction and maintenance programs. Annual expenditures for contracted tandem dump trucks are approximately \$1.5 Million. The estimate of the \$650,000 request includes the purchase of a snow plow and a sander for winter operations at approximately \$50,000 for each truck. The purchase of two Tandem Axle Dump Trucks will alleviate the use of Hired Equipment.

These two vehicles are planned to be purchased in 2017, however, Fleet is anticipating tendering and ordering these vehicles in 2016. In order to be able to award the contract to purchase the two tandem dump trucks, the funding is being raised now. Delivery and payment will take place in 2017.

1.3 Emergency Hose Reel Pump System (ENZ.0034)

\$12,000

This is additional funding to the amount raised in 2015 to reflect an increase in expected cost of this item. Total cost is expected to be \$87K. The Emergency Hose Reel Pump System will provide a quick set up system for bypassing sewer blockages in emergency situations. It will also be used for de-watering projects and pump station emergencies.

2.0 Conclusion:

It is recommended that Council approve the capital expenditure of \$962,000 Million for vehicle acquisitions, as outlined in this report and that Council authorize staff to bring down a Capital Reserves Bylaw in the amount of \$1,007,000 (inclusive of GST) to finance the capital programs as outlined in this report.

The 2016 – 2020 Annual Financial Plan provides funding for various multi-year capital improvements. 1.0 2016 CAPITAL PROGRAM

For capital programs that have plan in both 2016 and 2017, the funding for both years is being raised here in order to be able to award contracts for construction.

1.1 2016MRN

(EMA.0007)

\$200,000

The Major Roads Network (MRN) Rehabilitation Program is part of the City's ongoing infrastructure renewal strategy to sustainably maintain the primary transportation corridors. Project locations are determined based on pavement condition information provided by the City's Pavement Management System and input from Operations. This is an annual program fully funded through TransLink. The City interim finances these expenditures as payment transfers from TransLink are made on a quarterly basis. 1.3 Dover St, Royal Oak to Nelson

(ERA.0014)

\$455,000

The Transportation Division (Engineering) and the Planning Department have identified road improvements on Dover Street to improve the flow of vehicle traffic and to improve bicycle and pedestrian accessibility and safety. Some of the improvements include a new left turn bay at Dover & Nelson and a separated sidewalk on the south side of Dover.

Provisional funding was previously requested in December 2015. This additional funding was included in the Annual Plan due to a higher than expected actual tender price.

1.4 Rumble St – Boundary to McKay

(ERA.0049)

\$200,000

Major Roads Project involving upgrades to the existing Rumble Street road section, Boundary Road to McKay, including curb & gutter, sidewalk, urban trail, street lighting and utilities. As part of a fully integrated infrastructure renewal project, existing aging watermain and sanitary main will be replaced and the existing storm sewer system will be upsized to accommodate growth and re-development, in accordance with the Kaymar Creek Integrated Stormwater Management Plan recommendations.

Provisional funding was previously requested in December 2015. This additional funding was included in the Annual Plan due to revised project cost estimates.

1.5 2016 Streetlight & Sidewalk Program

Funding permitting, project locations in 2016 include Douglas Road (south of Lougheed Highway), Wayburne (Canada Way to Village Drive), and Dawson (Willingdon Av to Beta Av).

1.6 2015 Culvert Inspection & Rehab

(ELA.0015)

(ERA.0055)

\$100,000

The City is committed to maintaining its critical linear infrastructure. This project inspects the condition of City's critical storm sewer culverts to determine rehabilitation and maintenance needs. Critical culverts meet one or more of the following criteria: 600mm diameter or larger, crossing a watercourse, crossing a roadway, or highlighted in recent storm water management studies or by operations staff.

Provisional funding was previously requested in December 2015. This additional funding was included in the Annual Plan due to revised project cost estimates.

2.0 RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that Council approve the capital expenditure of \$1.465 Million for road capital improvements, as outlined in this report and that Council authorize staff to bring down a Capital Reserves Bylaw in the amount of \$1,533,500 Million (inclusive of GST) to finance the capital programs as outlined in this report.

The capital plan for this project is split \$100,000 for 2017 and \$1,100,000 for 2018. \$100,000 from 2018 is being brought forward to 2016 in order to enable design work in 2016.

2.3 Sanitary Services

(EKC.0008)

\$25,000

Through completion of Integrated Stormwater Management Plans (ISMP's), storm sewer CCTV inspections program, and input from Operations, the City has identified various storm sewer and culvert upgrades. These upgrades will address aging or undersized infrastructure. These projects are coordinated with the road rehabilitation projects in order to upgrade the crossing or adjacent roads that are currently in poor condition.

In order to proceed with designs for the 2017 Capital Program, funding approval is requested now. The design effort requires work in 2016 and 2017, and the 2016 component of design funding has already been approved by Council. This request involves the 2017 design funding component.

3.2 Storm Main Extensions (2017 Program)

(ELA.0025)

\$120,000

The 2016-2020 Capital Plan includes provision for cost-sharing with private development for infrastructure improvements not directly related to the proposed development. The program takes advantage of the development process in providing a cost-effective solution for upgrading the City's infrastructure adjacent to their development site, when considered desirable by the City. Typical works include pavement and storm sewer rehabilitation in coordination with development projects.

In order to proceed with designs for the 2017 Capital Program, funding approval is requested now. The design effort requires work in 2016 and 2017, and the 2016 component of design funding has already been approved by Council. This request involves the 2017 design funding component.

3.3 Storm Water Management (2017 Program) (ELD.0018)

The total cost of the above programs is estimated at \$4.615M. These programs are included in the 2016 – 2020 Annual Financial Plan and sufficient Capital Reserves and Funds are available to fund these works as outlined in this report.

It is recommended that Council authorize staff to bring down a Capital Reserves Bylaw in the amount of 3,276,300 (inclusive of GST), and draw from the Sanitary Sewer Capital Fund the amount of 1,200 (inclusive of GST) and the Waterworks Utility Capital Fund the amount of 1,200 (inclusive of GST) to finance the 1,200 Capital Programs as outlined in this report.
