MINUTES

An Open meeting of the Executive Committee of Council was held in the Council Committee Room, Main Floor, City Hall, 4949 Canada Way, Burnaby, BC on **Wednesday, 2020 February 05** at 4:00 p.m.

1. CALL TO ORDER

- PRESENT: Councillor Sav Dhaliwal, Chair Mayor Mike Hurley, Vice Chair Councillor Paul McDonell, Member Councillor James Wang, Member

The Chair called the Open meeting to order at 4:01 p.m.

The Chair, Councillor Dhaliwal, recognized the ancestral and unceded homelands of the handaminam and Skwxwú7mesh speaking peoples, and extended appreciation for the opportunity to hold a meeting on this shared territory.

2. <u>MINUTES</u>

(a) Minutes of the Executive Committee of Council Open meeting held on 2019 December 04

MOVED BY COUNCILLOR MCDONELL SECONDED BY COUNCILLOR WANG

THAT the minutes of the Executive Committee of Council Open meeting held on 2019 December 04 be adopted.

3. DELEGATIONS

(a) Descendants of the Komagata Maru Society Re: Recognition of Komagata Maru <u>Speaker</u>: Raj Singh Toor, Vice President and Spokesperson

<u>Mr. Raj Singh Toor</u>, Vice President and Spokesperson, Descendants of the Komagata Maru Society, appeared before the Committee to request naming of a civic asset in memory of the Komagata Maru passengers.

Mr. Toor advised that the Komagata Maru ship arrived in Vancouver on 1914 May 23 carrying 376 passengers from India. The Provincial and Federal Governments prevented passengers from disembarking, and limited the local Sikh community's access to the ship to provide food, water and medication. The ship was forced to return to India where British troops killed, injured and imprisoned the passengers.

The Provincial and Federal Governments have apologized for the incident, and the City of Brampton, Ontario, has opened a park in memory of the passengers.

In conclusion, Mr. Toor requested that the City name a civic asset (i.e. street or park) in memory of the Komagata Maru passengers.

The Committee inquired regarding other BC municipalities' initiatives on this matter.

The delegation advised that the City of Surrey has unveiled a commemorative street sign on the 75A Avenue.

Staff advised that the Federal Government has built a Komagata Maru monument in Coal Harbour.

Arising from discussion, the following motion was introduced:

 (b) The Fortius Foundation Re: Fortius Community Programs <u>Speakers</u>: Andy Price, Executive Director Dani Langford, Physiotherapist and Program Lead, BACK in the Game Program Jermaine John-Archer, Strength and Conditioning Coach and Program Lead, LifelongSTRONG Program

<u>Mr. Andy Price</u>, Executive Director, <u>Ms. Dani Langford</u>, Physiotherapist and Program Lead, BACK in the Game Program, and <u>Mr. Jermaine John-Archer</u>,

Strength and Conditioning Coach and Program Lead, LifelongSTRONG Program, The Fortius Foundation, appeared before the Committee to provide information on community programs.

The delegation advised that the charitable Foundation owns the Fortius Sport & Health facility in Burnaby, and supports individuals' fitness and recreational goals through programs, including:

- BACK in the Game (multidisciplinary program for youth ages 11 to 17 with back pain returning to sport and regular physical activity);
- LifeLongSTRONG (strength and balance, low impact cardiovascular and mobility program for adults); and
- KidsMove Schools (inclusive physical literacy program for children ages nine to 12 which increases participants' confidence and physical activity).

BACK in the Game has 80% success rate, and the KidsMove Schools has engaged over 1,250 children and 50 teachers. The Foundation's programs are supported by many organizations in the community, including Burnaby Firefighters and the City.

In conclusion, the delegation requested an operating grant in support of its capacity to extend programs and enhance their sustainability.

The Committee inquired if funding may be provided for a specific program, and regarding the use of an operating grant (compared to a program grant provided in 2019). Further, the Committee inquired if program participants incur any cost.

Mr. Price confirmed that funding can be targeted, and advised the grant would be used to: build the fundraising and research capacity (to understand the programs' impact) and increase awareness about the programs.

The School District 41 covers the transportation costs for the KidsMove Schools, and participants do not incur any costs. Further, Mr. Price advised that the Foundation offers bursaries for the BACK in the Game and subsidizes the LifelongSTRONG.

Arising from discussion, the following motion was introduced:

In 2019, at least 1,686 unique calls and chats originated in Burnaby with approximately 1,505

residents accessing the online chat. In 2020, the organization's goals include: recruitment of approximately 280 new volunteers; enrollment of approximately 140 new volunteers in training programs; and securing funding for more paid crisis services responders and/or training facilitators.

RE: The McCarthy Properties Invitational Chainsaw Competition In Support of Burnaby Hospital and The BC Cancer Foundation Proposed Venue: Burnaby, B.C. <u>The Summer of 2020 or 2021</u>

Further to my previous brief discussions with the Mayor, I am proposing the possibility of staging a unique event which would be of great interest and enjoyment to the citizens of Burnaby and the region. Accordingly, I am submitting for your consideration a request to support in principle a by invitation chainsaw competition that would see the world's best chainsaw artists carve and compete in Burnaby. The initial date for your consideration was the week of June 15, 2020, or possibly later in the summer. If not this year, then I would still propose the event for the following year (summer 2021). This competition would not only provide a great summer event for the City, but its purpose would also be to raise awareness and support for our Burnaby Hospital and BC Cancer. The recent and most welcome announcement that our Burnaby Hospital would be redeveloped, and that this would incorporate a world class BC Cancer clinic is monumental for the City. As a supporter of both our hospital and BC Cancer, and a lifelong resident and business owner in Burnaby, I think it critically important to promote these two institutions and in turn make our fellow citizens aware of what they are to receive.

Burnaby Hospital and BC Cancer have long been the prime focus of my personal and professional support and my family's philanthropy. In addition to what I have done for Burnaby Hospital, our Jambor-McCarthy Legacy for BC Cancer is unprecedented.

In addition, I am a former Chair of Burnaby Hospital Foundation, and a current patron. I am again chairing the hospital's second and most critically current Capital Campaign for our new hospital. (I chaired the first major Capital Campaign several years ago.)

Therefore, the possibility, and now the reality of having our hospital linked permanently with BC Cancer is something I have long worked for and am immensely proud of and grateful for. We all should be. I think it is very important for us in Burnaby to grow this pending relationship. It will be one of the great legacies in Burnaby's history and our hospital and Cancer clinic will serve our citizens well – forever.

This leads me back to what I am presenting to you by this letter. This is a world-class carving event and competition.

Chainsaw Carving and Carvers

I am a big admirer and collector of chainsaw carvings (which supplement my extensive First Nations art collection very well.) Every two years there is the World Chainsaw Carving Championship in Hope, B.C., which proudly proclaims itself the "Chainsaw Capital of the World." There are roughly 100 large carvings permanently displayed throughout Hope. Organizations and private collectors like myself also purchase these unique works of art.

I know the chainsaw carving circuit well and most of the premier carvers. The professionals make their living by attending competitions and shows and the sale of commissioned pieces. At a chainsaw competition, they generally have expenses covered and then make revenue by way of selling pieces, either by "quick carve" competitions, or by their final piece which they have generally worked on for 2 - 3 days.

Here are some videos of chainsaw carving from the Hope, B.C. world championships. They are worth watching in their entirety.

I have attached for you some photographs of chainsaw art. These include the "Spirt of Hope", a commissioned piece gifted to the province by myself; "Between Hope and Hell's Gate", the grand champion winner from the 2019 Hope competition which I own; and four examples of 1 hour quick carves. All of these pieces are carved from original designs by chainsaw. It is quite amazing and fascinating to watch the skill and the expertise. This is an event of interest for all ages.

What traditionally occurs is that the carvers set up individual carving areas in an allotted area and they work on their main piece and prepare for quick carvings. There is always food and displays and other activities involved. The Town of Hope does a nice job of the event. Perhaps the major event in the province is up in Chetwynd, B.C.. There are other regional carving events as well. The carvers carve throughout the year on a circuit.

At the end of this letter, I have affixed several photos and articles which further highlight the event I envision and am proposing.

THE PROPOSED EVENT

In general, at this time, I see the event unfolding as follows:

 Invite 8 – 12 premier carvers. This would include the experienced and a few skilled younger carvers; some excellent women carvers; First Nation carvers; etc. Again, I know most of the carvers and have discussed this with several of them. 2. Stage the event in Burnaby. My thinking is Central Park by the Patterson Skytrain station. My thinking is there is parking (by the site and at Swangard Stadium); lots of open space, and Skytrain for ease of access. Here is the aerial of the proposed site. The location would be the right-hand corner of the park.



- 3. Make this a true invitational. The carvers would work on a major piece which ideally would be pre-sold to individuals or companies. (Traditionally the sale price is split between the carver and the host organization. I would refine this a little. The idea is that funds would go to Burnaby Hospital and BC Cancer Foundation.)
- 4. Major pieces could go on a gratis basis to:
 - Burnaby City Hall
 - Burnaby Hospital
 - BC Cancer
- 5. The carvers would also do quick carves which are fascinating to watch. These pieces are also auctioned off with a cash split between carver and host.
- 6. Try to secure sponsorship for the event and the carvers. (Some sponsors could "pay" for a carving.) They require room and board and some travel expenses. The major expense is suitable logs for carving.
- 7. Engage the Burnaby Hospital Foundation and BC Cancer Foundation to participate. This is a community/family event and in addition to funds raised, and just as important, is raising awareness and support of the campaigns.

- 8. I am sure the Burnaby Fire Fighters would participate. Barbecuing is always popular at these events. I would do an outreach to some First Nations as well.
- 9. Family activities could also be part of the event, including music, etc. The focus is always on the carvers, but the location at Central Park I envision is expansive and could be activated quite easily.
- 10. May July are the best months depending on the scheduled carving events for the year. I initially targeted the week of June 15, 2020. However, this week I have been advised that some of the carvers that I would want to "headline" the event might not be available at this time. Therefore, the proposed timing would be possibly this summer, but perhaps more likely next summer (2021) when we can secure the best carvers to stage the very best event. Commitment from Burnaby is the key for either year. Real planning cannot begin until we know if the City supports the concept and the location is available.
- 11. The logistics and planning for the event can be coordinated through my office, by myself personally.
- 12. There would be no cost to the City or Burnaby Hospital and BC Cancer. I would hope that the City of Burnaby would participate as they would for any regular community event within reason. I envision this as being a one-time event and I would underwrite the cost less any sponsorship to stage a first-class event. Any future events of this type could be discussed going forward.
- 13. The most important consideration sought from Burnaby is if the City is in support and approval in principle of this event, the dates, and if Central Park could be used.
- 14. The key logistical consideration is the availability and commitment of world class carvers to participate.

PROPOSED DATE OF EVENT

The proposed date for this invitational would be the summer of either 2020 or 2021. Any dates would be subject to the availability of the best carvers in the world and the City's consent.

(The reason for the summer dates is that the best carvers are competing in a circuit of major events, most notably Chetwynd, B.C. (every year) and Hope, B.C. (every second year.)

I understand this is short notice but the logistics of this event could be coordinated through my office. Please note that every second year, the world chainsaw competition is held in Hope, B.C. Therefore, next year the carvers will be focusing on Chetwynd, then Hope. This off year affords Burnaby the opportunity to have the best carvers show their skills to the community.

I have affixed information from last year's 2019 World Class Chainsaw Carving Competition at Hope, B.C. This gives you some background on the event, the carvers, and the organization. I have also affixed a picture and a newspaper article from this week regarding the unveiling of a chainsaw carving I commissioned in support of the BC Cancer Ride to Conquer Cancer which starts in Cloverdale and ends in Hope.)

COMMITMENT REQUIRED FROM THE CITY OF BURNABY

To make this event happen requires essentially the following:

- 1. The City of Burnaby authorizing the use of the northeast corner of Central Park for the event.
- 2. Any other support the City of Burnaby wishes to offer.
- 3. Securing the commitment of a select group of chainsaw carvers.
- 4. Coordinating the fundraising component with Burnaby Hospital and the BC Cancer Foundation.
- 5. Engaging select members of the Burnaby and area business community and others to be sponsors of the event, and/or a carver.
- 6. Underwriting upfront costs of this one-time competition. (If the event was held and successful, perhaps it could become a bi-annual event or an occasional event.) Time is now of the essence.

I would be pleased to work with the City and conclude any required or requested agreements governing such matters.

I can advise and commit to seeing conditions 3- 6 through. You would have my personal commitment on this.

If the City of Burnaby would like to further discuss this and/or give conditional approval, then I could contact the chainsaw carvers I have been discussing this matter with in confidence. This is the critical component, as we would want only the best in the world

to participate. (And this includes a diverse group of carvers including women and First Nations artists.)

I would be pleased to provide specific details to any inquiry or questions and can certainly expand and make the more formal presentation.

At this point in time I am seeking your input and whether or not there is support for an event which would be truly unique and I know extremely well received by the citizens of Burnaby and the region. I also know that Burnaby Hospital and BC Cancer Foundation would greatly appreciate the awareness that this event would draw to their causes.





The Burnaby Hospital Foundation is all about people.

Though its mission is to provide state-of-the-art medical equipment and new technology into the local hospital facility, the heart of this organization is people: the volunteers and staff who help make it all happen, and the patients who are helped through their efforts.

The foundation is currently in the midst of a multimillion dollar campaign to bring an urgently needed second CT scanner, along with other vital medical imaging equipment, to Burnaby Hospital. Since CT scanners are the "workhorses" of the emergency department, having a second unit will have an immense impact on patients.

To make it happen requires a lot of caring volunteers and their time, effort and energy. SUBJECT: CITY INVOLVEMENT IN BURNABY PRIDE

PURPOSE: To propose expanded City involvement and support of Burnaby Pride.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. **THAT** the Committee request Council to approve the City involvement in Burnaby Pride as outlined in *Section 4.0* of this report.
- 2. THAT the Committee request Council authorize use of one time Gaming Interest funds in the amount of \$70,000 in support of Burnaby Pride, as outlined in *Section 4.2* of this report.
- 3. THAT a copy of this report be forwarded to the Financial Management Committee, the Social Planning Committee and the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission for information.

REPORT

1.0 BACKGROUND

At its meeting of 2020 February 5, the Executive Committee passed a motion requesting staff to bring forward a report outlining avenues for the City to support the financial and operational sustainability of the annual Burnaby Pride community celebration. This report responds to that request.

On 2018 August 11, the first-ever Pride celebration was hosted in Burnaby on Jubilee Avenue in the Metrotown area. This important inaugural event attracted approximately 800 people and featured local performances, booths showcasing community resources, and unveiled Burnaby's first rainbow crosswalk¹. Based upon requests from the public, the event was organized by an adhoc group of representatives from local non-profit organizations (e.g. Burnaby Neighbourhood House, Burnaby Family Life), with the informal support of Burnaby Public Library, City of

¹ Since 2018, five more rainbow crosswalks have been installed, one in each quadrant of the City and one in front of City Hall across Deer Lake Parkway.

Burnaby Youth Services, and Social Planning. The event received a Festivals Burnaby grant of \$3,500 in 2018.

The 2019 event took place over two days at Civic Square (August 9) and again on Jubilee Avenue (August 10). These celebrations attracted approximately 1,500 people and featured a wide range of performers, participatory art experiences, and community resources and programs. The event was again organized by the working group noted above, and with the input of a Pride Community Advisory Network (composed of a wide range of Burnaby community members). Burnaby Public Library, City of Burnaby Youth Services and Social Planning again informally supported the event, with the added participation of Bonsor Recreation Complex and Community Arts staff. As well, Burnaby RCMP provided security for the event. The event received a Festivals Burnaby grant of \$12,500 in 2019.

This report outlines a suggested scope of City involvement in Burnaby Pride 2020, in order to support the financial and operational sustainability

2.0 POLICY CONTEXT

The suggested scope of City involvement in Burnaby Pride is supported by the following policy context:

- Equity Policy, approved by Council in 1994, which states that "The City has a duty to its citizens to set a positive example and foster a climate of understanding and mutual respect"; and the
- Burnaby Social Sustainability Strategy, approved by Council in 2011, includes a primary goal of 'Community Inclusion'. This goal is particularly concerned with ensuring the City is "welcoming of all cultures, identities and abilities", and focuses on "principles of economic and social security and justice".

In addition to the policies noted above, the *Plan* supports a number of goals and sub-goals of the *Corporate Strategic Plan*:

- An Inclusive Community
 - Celebrate diversity Create more opportunities for the community to celebrate diversity
 - Serve a diverse community Ensure City services fully meet the needs of our dynamic community
 - Create a sense of community Provide opportunities that encourage and welcome all community members and create a sense of belonging
- A Thriving Organization
 - Organizational culture Ensure that our core values are reflected in our policies, programs and services delivery

3.0 LGBTQIA2S+ COMMUNITY MEMBERS IN BURNABY

As a result of the long-standing discrimination that LGBTQIA2S+² community members have, and continue to, experience, a dearth of longitudinal statistics exist. However, it is generally estimated that approximately 2-5% of the Canadian population identify as LGBTQIA2S+. These numbers have increased over time, and are higher among younger people. Approximately 10% of those aged 18 to 34 years self-report as LGBTQIA2S+.

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Limited services for LGBTQIA2S+ community members currently exist in Burnaby. Those that are in place are largely for youth via the Burnaby School District, SFU and BCIT. In the absence of such programs individuals have to travel outside of Burnaby, primarily to Vancouver and Surrey, in order to access appropriate programming and services. This reality demonstrates how LGBTQIA2S+ individuals still experience marginalization in terms of access to supports and services.

Within this local context, the hosting of an annual Pride event is of particular importance as a symbol of visible community inclusion and celebration. The following quote, received by staff from a Burnaby community member after the 2019 event, underscores this importance:

"Thank you, heartfelt from my soul – know that all your effort and passion have had an incredible positive impact on so many people and for so many people. I grew up in Burnaby and never thought I'd get to participate in an intergenerational event like Burnaby Pride in my own city."

Pride also has provided as an opportunity for community members to connect and learn about resources, particularly for Burnaby young people and their families. As well, the event has proved important for the formation of partnership between non-profit organizations, and has led to the expansion of several targeted programs into Burnaby (e.g. Chronically Queer at Burnaby Neighbourhood House / 'I Belong' at MOSAIC).

For the larger Burnaby community, the even promotes understanding and fosters a sense of community while symbolizing the City's (and the wider community's) commitment to celebrating diversity and creating inclusion.

4.0 BURNABY PRIDE

In 2020, Burnaby Pride will be hosted on Saturday, July 25th from 2:00pm – 9:00pm at Civic Square (next to Bob Prittie Metrotown Library). Collected feedback from 2019 Pride indicated that attendees loved the centrality and beauty of the Civic Square location. As well, it was suggested to keep the event to one day to focus community energy and attention. From 2:00pm – 5:00pm, a range of all-ages activities will occur including performances by local artists, participatory arts projects, children's games, informational booths about local/regional services and programs for the LBGTQIA2S+ community, a 'pop-up' library, and a range of food options. From 5:00pm – 9:00pm

² LGBTQIA2S+: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersexual, Asexual, Two-Spirited and 'other'.

the focus will shift to the main stage, which will feature local drag artists and a two-set performance by the locally famous, self-proclaimed "LGBTQ Event Band" Queer as Funk. A range of food and drink options (non-alcoholic) will also be available.

4.1 Proposed City Support for Burnaby Pride

As this important community event has increased in size and complexity, the organization of it has become increasingly large-scale, and the existing ad hoc working group require capacity and financial support to ensure the event's continued sustainability. The community members and supportive non-profit organizations involved in the event working group have communicated to staff that they wish to retain 'ownership' of the event in terms of its content and direction. However, there is a crucial logistical supportive role for the City.

More specifically, it is proposed that an Arts Services events staff member (within Cultural Services – Parks, Recreation and Culture Department) join the event planning working group to contribute their logistical expertise in planning and hosting large-scale events. Burnaby Public Library and Social Planning staff will also continue to provide organizational support to the Pride Community Advisory Network noted above. Burnaby RCMP will also again be approached to provide event security.

In addition to this logistical event support, it is proposed that the City assist Burnaby Pride with marketing and promotion, more specifically:

- Posting the event on the City website, in the calendar section and as a time-limited feature on the home page;
- Promotion of the event through City Connect and civic social media channels;
- Inclusion of event poster in City allotted bus stop panels; and,
- Other promotion avenues as determined by staff.

These efforts will continue to 'spread the word' about Pride and further underscores the City's efforts to implement the *Corporate Strategic Plan* in order to be inclusive and welcoming for all community members.

4.2 Proposed Funding

In order to enable the support outlined above, it is proposed that \$70,000 in one-time Gaming Interest funds be allocated to Burnaby Pride 2020. If approved, these monies will be managed by Arts Services and includes the staffing capacity described above, infrastructure costs (e.g. fencing, portable toilets, staging and sound equipment), artist's fees to support local talent, and promotional activities. Beyond 2020, associated costs will be included in the annual Arts Services budgeting cycle. If approved, these monies would support Burnaby Pride in lieu of receiving further Festival Burnaby grant applications.

5.0 **RECOMMENDATIONS**

Pride events are of particular importance to create a sense of belonging for LGBTQIA2S+ community members, many of whom continue to experience stigma, bias, and limited access to services and safe spaces. The sense of inclusion generated by such an event also benefits all community members and encourages community cohesion.

As such, it is recommended that the Committee request Council to approve the City involvement in Burnaby Pride as outlined in *Section 4.0* of this report. As well, it is recommended that the Committee request Council authorize use of one time Gaming Interest funds in the amount of \$70,000 in support of Burnaby Pride, as outlined in *Section 4.2* of this report. Finally, it is recommended that a copy of this report be forwarded to the Financial Management Committee, the Social Planning Committee, and the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission for information.

D. PURPOSE OR BENEFIT

1. Describe the purpose or goal of the project/event/program.

The Burnaby MoreSports program was originally developed in 2007 by our founding partners - City of Burnaby's Parks, Recreation & Cultural Services, Burnaby School District and Burnaby Neighbourhood House - to give more young people the chance to participate in sports activities, enjoy healthier lifestyles and develop a deeper connection with their local community.

The Burnaby MoreSports Society was established in 2011, and since then its mission has been to create sustainable community sport programs, so that all children and youth have an opportunity to develop fundamental life skills and a love of sport. We want to see every child in this city, regardless of social or economic background or special needs, regularly participate in a sport and develop a life-long love of being active.

Today, Burnaby MoreSports Society (BMS) is a registered charity that delivers free sports recreation, mentoring and leadership opportunities for over 500 young people from grades 2-12 in Burnaby each year.

2. Describe the project/event/program, and the activities.

BMS programs serve multiple age groups (from ages 6-18) at the same time. Programs create safe, inclusive spaces for children (6-9) to play team sports and develop basic skills, while providing volunteer opportunities for junior coaches (10-11) as program assistants and training for senior coaches (15-18) as program leaders under the supervision of our experienced staff.

Players are instructed in physical literacy (how to move, throw and catch) and develop physical competencies over time, which builds their confidence and motivation to learn and develop skills in each sport. Junior coaches assist program staff and learn how to manage groups, gaining confidence with responsibility. Senior coaches from local high schools receive program orientations, free professional development training (HIGH FIVE) and mentoring from program staff in how to plan and run programs, which develops their leadership skills and increases their potential for future employment after graduation.

Everyone participating in programs and events – from participants to volunteers to staff – are guided by four basic principles of play: Sweat (work hard), Smile (have fun), Safety & Sportsmanship. These principles create a positive and supportive environment from day one, which helps develops everyone's level of engagement and self-esteem over time.

BMS offers multi-sport programming during the school year: Basketball (Fall), handball and floor hockey (Winter) and soccer (Spring). Typically, weekly program sessions run for 8 weeks each term with schools assigned one day per week based on their own activities schedule and the availability of facilities. Outdoor play is always encouraged, if weather and facilities permit. At the end of each term, BMS brings all schools together by hosting a sports festival to showcase what the players and coaches have learned during their time with us.

All participants and coaches receive their own t-shirts to keep and use throughout the year. These help to establish a strong sense of identity, belonging and structure within each program. Healthy snacks (fruits and veggies) are provided at all programs to give everyone access to nutritional food to fuel productive play.

3. Describe how the project/event/program fits into the chosen grant category.

Burnaby MoreSports Society (BMS) is a Burnaby-based non-profit society and registered charity providing programs and services for hundreds of local young residents and their families each year. BMS is applying for funding from the City of

Burnaby to support out-of-school programs and events at up to 8 elementary schools in Burnaby in 2019-20. This funding request for \$10,000 comprises less than 10% of the total estimated budget to deliver all program activities during the year.

4. Describe how this project/event/program will benefit residents of Burnaby (who will benefit). How many Burnaby residents will be involved with or benefit from the project?

Burnaby MoreSports has provided services for thousands of young people in the local community of Burnaby since 2007. Each year, BMS programs, events and camps serve more than 400 children and 100 youth coaches and their families. By bringing multiple age groups from local elementary and high schools together, BMS programs foster peer-to-peer and youth-to-mentor relationships that build new links in a more connected and caring community.

5. Describe how the project/event/program aligns with one or more of the following (Social Sustainability Plan, Environmental Sustainability Plan, Official Community Plan):

The Burnaby MoreSports program fits well into the City of Burnaby's strategic plans. We promote healthy, active lifestyles for all young people and their families. We create a safe environment for young people of different ages to learn and grow together by working hard, having fun and playing fairly. We facilitate connections between people and places. We create a sense of identity and belonging, with inclusive programs especially for those who are most at-risk or vulnerable as a result of their diverse abilities, backgrounds or circumstances. We develop employment skills and opportunities for youth coaches to find work, with youth volunteer coaches coming back to work as paid staff. Our work helps individuals become leaders, who can contribute back to a thriving local community.

6. Identify your community partners or stakeholders – you may also include letters of support for your project/event/ program from these groups as part of the application.

Our community partners continue to be all of our founding partners - the City of Burnaby Parks, Recreation & Cultural Services, Burnaby School District and Burnaby Neighbourhood House. In addition, over the last three years, BMS has been in partnership with the local chapter of Social Venture Partners (SVP) to build the internal capacity that will enable us to scale up program growth to reach more young people in need.

7. If the amount requested from the City of Burnaby is not fully granted, what would you do to make up the difference and/ or how would you proceed differently?

We trust the City of Burnaby will recognize that our involvement in the positive development of hundreds of children and youth in this city every year is something that is worthy of their support and involvement. BMS will continue with new fund development activities to ensure financial viability and multiple sources of funding in the future.

E. EVENT OUTCOMES

1. How will you know if your project/event/program reached its goals? (for example, a goal of engaging youth in environmental activities might include reaching a set target of youth participants)

A main strategic objective for BMS over the last three years has been to expand the number of programs being offered.

In 2018-19, BMS expanded programs and camps to serve 8 Burnaby schools in 2018-19 (up by 60% over the previous two years).

BMS has been actively monitoring the numbers of program sessions delivered, the numbers and genders of players and coaches participating, and the numbers of at-risk participants, to make sure we are reaching our target audience.

BMS works with school staff and meets throughout the year to review program performance and targets at each school.

2. What data and feedback do you collect from your audience/participants? How do you evaluate your programs and services?

BMS monitors program performance by:

1. Maintaining program statistics for number of programs, gender of participants and coaches, program attendance, volunteer hours, and number of contacts with adults

2. Senior staff perform regular QUEST 2 (HIGH FIVE) evaluations of programs each term

3. BMS circulates parent feedback surveys at events

- 4. Planning and developing social impact evaluation surveys (with SVP)
- 5. Evaluates program performance and outcomes in meetings with external community stakeholders

BMS sports festivals at the end of term are a showcase for players and coaches to demonstrate what they have learned.

At these events, when we survey parents to ask how our programs are impacting their children, we hear some wonderful stories, such as this one:

"What I like most about Burnaby MoreSports is the way it allows the kids to grow and experience different sports in a supportive environment. It fosters a camaraderie amongst the kids that helps them build stronger relationships and leadership skills.

It is a huge benefit to have this program available in my son's school. It gives us access to a variety of sports at no cost with amazing coaches.

I have seen a huge change in my son over the years he's attended. His confidence and comfort in trying new things and the enjoyment he gets from participating is priceless. The coaches truly care about the kids and it shows."

In addition, BMS hosts regular meetings with school staff during the school year to receive feedback on how programs are performing. This is what one of the senior staff said at the last meeting:

"MoreSports is setting the standard for after-school programs. To have MoreSports in our school has become one of our first priorities in planning after-school programming."

The long-term benefits of the program are best demonstrated by volunteer coaches who complete their high school education and return to BMS as paid program staff to teach the next generation of local children and youth from their own community. Over the last two years, six program graduates have worked as BMS program staff!

The number of revenue streams has doubled since 2016, with corporate, event and individual giving growing over time. The budget in 2019-20 has increased by more than 50% in two years to support program growth.

BMS programs have been developed to serve at-risk children and youth in particular. BMS staff work proactively with elementary and high school staff to ensure program participants and coaches are selected based on demonstrated need. Programs engage with underserved and marginalized groups, including girls, those from low-income families, refugees and immigrants, and those experiencing social and cultural isolation. Last year, 51% of volunteer youth coaches were female, 59% of program participants were from immigrant/refugee families, individual schools reported that 37-47% of children in programs were from vulnerable categories, and 4% of children were known to have developmental and/or behavioural challenges.
