To the Executive Committee of Council:

Please find attached the *Autism Speaks Canada's* request letter. We are the premier awareness and walk event for the autism community and we are returning to Burnaby after an absence of many years. This event brings together families, service providers, entertainers, corporations and other nonprofits from the autism community. We are hoping to make Burnaby our permanent home for the walk.

As outlined in our earlier proposal we may have the title "<u>Walk</u>" in our event name but we are primarily about "<u>Awareness</u>". Awareness is one of the four pillars of *Autism Speaks Canada* as well as Advocacy; Resource and Research. Awareness is the primary focus of this family festival event.

This event is a free day of Celebration for the Autism Community. As with the *Pride Festival* we are a *festival* and *walk* that *celebrates* who we are. We walk in the community to inform and proudly display and inform. Although it is a fundraiser and is *Autism Speaks Canada's* largest campaign only <u>42% of our 2000 participants will</u> <u>actually raise any funds at all or even register</u>. The entire event is free with families and organizations attending from all over the lower mainland.

About Autism Speaks Canada

Autism Speaks is the world's leading autism science and advocacy organization. Since its inception, Autism Speaks and Autism Speaks Canada have invested over \$6 million in Canadian autism research; building the capacity for services across the country; raising public awareness; collaborating with other organizations to advocate alongside the autism community. Autism Speaks Canada is committed to raising the funds necessary to improve lives today and transform lives tomorrow across the autism spectrum and lifespan. Our Walk Now for Autism Speaks events, family services grants and Light It Up Blue campaign are examples of ASC's annual programs.

What is our Mission?

• At Autism Speaks Canada, our mission is to change the future for all who struggle with autism spectrum disorders.

Why ASC needs funding:

 Each year costs increase and funding becomes harder to obtain. It was this reason that the event has been relocated to Burnaby from Vancouver. It allows for free parking for our families and Skytrain access. However relocating comes with increased costs with more advertisement and possible venue costs (larger participation costs will increase park route fees).

Who does ASC support?

Autism Speaks Canada supports the whole community. ASC is dedicated to helping all individuals impacted by autism spectrum disorder (individuals with ASD, caregivers, family members, service providers). Through our Awareness, Advocacy, Family Services and Scientific Research initiatives, we fund programs and collaborate with others to ensure that the needs of our ASD stakeholders are met *today* and *tomorrow*.

Where does the money go?

All money raised in Canada stays in Canada.

The dollars go towards funding the four pillars of *Autism Speaks Canada's* mission – to raise **awareness** of autism; fund autism related **research** into the causes, biology, better diagnosis, effective treatments, and the dissemination of knowledge into practice; to **advocate** for the whole community; and to increase the resources that are provided to individuals, families and communities.

• What types of community family services community grants does Autism Speaks Canada fund?

Autism Speaks Canada funds service providers in the areas of education, recreation and community activities, and young adult/adult services. Any charitable organization across Canada is eligible to apply for these grants. Grants are up to \$25,000 for a one year duration. <u>We have funded Burnaby organizations for the last four years of up to \$25,000 per year for a total of \$100,000.</u>

We are applying for \$1500 in grant funds. We plan to use the fees to increase participation levels by offering enhanced Kids areas with more interactive programmes. Supplies will also be covered with this. We would also be able to enhanced Children's performers with a small honorarium. Performers to be determined.
