### THE CONCEPT

Young adults are confronted by many difficulties produced by a complex society, such as economic instability, finding reliable and environmentally sustainable food sources, and overcoming challenges to our democratic system. As current and future members of the workforce, they will be forced to find solutions for the world to develop sustainably. Sustainable development represents an ideal in which civil growth, social equity and a thriving environment all play a part in creating a world where our community can flourish.

To protect our future, youth must have the tools to assess their community's challenges and be empowered to launch solutions. They must understand the importance of organizations, institutions, and grassroots initiatives and how, together, they can collaborate in order to achieve sustainable development.

The Sustainable Communities Conference connects youth with BC's sustainable development community in order to share knowledge and tools between seasoned and emerging leaders. In BC, over 2,500 civil society organizations, including research institutes, corporations, trusts, and non-governmental organizations are working to pursue the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The United Nations Development Programme (2017) describes the SDGs collectively as a "universal call to action to end poverty, protect the planet and ensure that all people enjoy peace and prosperity." Communities in BC have demonstrated that local projects can create local impact, which supports global goals.

Through speeches and dialogue, attendees have the chance to learn from social changemakers - community members who have a "deep-rooted sense of empathy for others, identify a specific problem or opportunity to tackle, and give themselves permission to do something about it from industry, academia, and civic society." (Ashoka, 2016) By learning how changemakers address the SDGs, youth can develop tools to implement their own projects, understand key stakeholders, and become leaders in sustainable development in their communities.

## The conference will explore:

- Local Sustainable Development in a Global Context
  - What is the current discourse on sustainable development, at the local, regional, national and international levels?
  - What are the UN Sustainable Development Goals, and how do local projects use them to address local challenges?
- Creating Global Impact through Local Projects
  - How do the various sectors (i.e. academia, business, government, etc.) fit into a sustainable future? What are some local approaches and initiatives?
- Intergenerational Collaboration
  - How can youth champion the SDGs and work alongside older generations in pursuit of a peaceful future?

### The NGO Exhibition will:

- Allow NGOs non-profits, social entrepreneurs, academics, and the like to showcase their projects/organizations
  - Representatives from each organization will present to event attendees their displays, which will include information about the organization and its initiatives
- Allow students to explore their own sustainable development interest area and gain a greater understanding of sustainability in relation to the broader local community
- Provide a space for event attendees to connect with local sustainability initiatives, and for local organizations to reach out to engaged youth in our community
- Provide an opportunity for event attendees, speakers, and organizations to mingle and have one-on-one conversations about sustainable development
