#### SUBJECT: 2019/2020 COMMUNITY SCHOOL GRANT

**PURPOSE:** To request approval and authorization of an agreement with the Burnaby School District #41 for the support and operation of eight Community Schools.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- 1. **THAT** approval be given for the expenditure of \$496,799.00 as the City of Burnaby's share of the operating funds for the 2019/2020 Community School Program.
- 2. THAT the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission recommend Council authorize the execution of an agreement with the Burnaby School District #41 for the support and operation of eight Community Schools (Byrne Creek, Edmonds, Gilmore, Lochdale, Maywood, Second Street, Stride, Stoney Creek and Stride Avenue).
- **3. THAT** a copy of this report be forwarded to the Burnaby Board of Education for their information.

### <u>REPORT</u>

#### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

The City of Burnaby and School District #41 have been working together since 1974 to provide services to the citizens of Burnaby. The eight Burnaby Community Schools fill a valuable role in our neighbourhoods by, welcoming community into the facilities throughout the day for programs, events, resources, and gathering spaces. They provide an additional layer of recreation and community services to the citizens of Burnaby in a warm, inviting and encouraging environment. For over 40 years this longstanding partnership, supported by the funding, allows the following to be achieved:

# 3.0 BACKGROUND

The District Community School Advisory and Coordinating Committee (DCSACC) provides guidance and direction to the Community School program. Committee members are parent representatives from each community school, one School Trustee, one Commission member, one Council member and one member at large. At its meeting of 2019 April 25, the DCSACC approved the 2019/2020 Community School budget. As has been the practice for many years, the Committee requests the School District and the City of Burnaby provide the funds for the continued operation of the eight Community Schools for the 2019-2020 school year.

A letter from the Burnaby School District #41 (<u>Attachment #1</u>) includes the request and outlines the Community Schools' operating budget and funding sources for the upcoming year. This budget requests a \$12,561.00 increase to overall base contribution levels from the City to address projected increases for employee benefits for 2019/2020. The School District will be correspondingly increasing its contribution by \$19,647.00. This funding is distributed equally to each school and covers the core requirements. All community schools supplement their community education programs

and neighbourhood activities through a variety of fund raising activities, grants, donations and sponsorships.

#### 4.0 **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that approval be given for the expenditure of \$496,799.00 as the city's share of the funds to operate Burnaby's Community schools. The funds are included in the City's Annual Budget. It is further recommended that the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission recommend that Council authorize the execution of an agreement with the Burnaby School District #41 for the support and operation of eight Community Schools (Byrne Creek, Edmonds, Gilmore, Lochdale, Maywood, Second Street, Stride, Stoney Creek and Stride Avenue) and that a copy of this report be forwarded to the Burnaby Board of Education for their information.

#### 2019/2020 COMMUNITY SCHOOL OPERATING BUDGET INFORMATION

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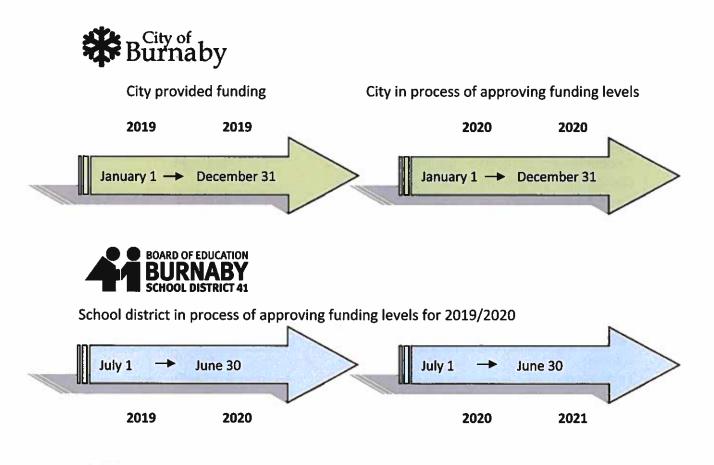
The community school program in Burnaby is supported by an integrated funding model involving the school district, City of Burnaby, provincial government, organizations and community residents.

The City of Burnaby and the school district have an operating agreement which outlines the process for receiving community school designation status and a funding formula to support community school operations.

The provincial government through the Ministry of Education's CommunityLINK funding provides the school district with the funds to support a number of school based social service programs such as school meals, children, youth and family support services and community schools. Many of these services are integral elements of the district's community school model.

The community school budget merges the school district financial year (school year July 1 – June 30) with the city calendar year (January 1 – December 31) to produce an 18 month budget cycle. It is further complicated by the provincial government's budget year (April 1 – March 31). The budget that is being proposed is for the 2019-20 school year (July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020).

The following graphic may be helpful in understanding how the funding partnership works:



#### 2019-20 Budget Preparation Guiding Principles

- Budget includes provision for a \$32,188 increase to overall base contribution levels from the City and School District to address projected increases for employee wages and benefits for 2019-20
- Budget provides for an equitable distribution of funds to each designated community school
- Budget recognizes that each community school enhances their community education program through a variety of other funding sources including provincial and federal government summer program grants
- Budget uses the historical community school cost sharing agreement to determine the level funding required from the City of Burnaby and the School District for the operation of the community school programs for 2019-20
- Requests the City increase its contribution by \$12,561 from \$484,238 to \$496,799 to cover its share of the overall cost of providing the existing community schools program in 2019-20
- Requests the School District increase its contribution by \$19,647 from \$764,938 to \$784,585 to cover its share of the overall cost of providing the existing community schools program in 2019-20
