## D. PURPOSE OR BENEFIT\*

1. Describe the purpose or goal of the project/event/program.

SDC hopes to provide children with disabilities, specifically those who are easily overstimulated by sound and movement, with a safe environment through our supportive programs, in which they can participate freely. For those who are more comfortable with active social interaction, we offer our Building Bridges with Music (BBM) music therapy program. This program uses music as a mediator to promote socialization between children with disabilities and children without disabilities. With our creative therapy programs, we are not so much concerned about improving the musical and artistic abilities of children; rather, we hope that children participating in the program will become more well-adjusted and self-confident in their own expressive abilities.

#### 2. Describe the project/event/program, and the activities.

The Building Bridges through Music (BBM) program provides after-school music therapy led by a professional music therapist in several (up to 10) locations around the Metro Vancouver area throughout the year. The BBM program focuses on socialization between children with and without disabilities, with musical activity as a mediator; we believe that music enables children who may be unable to express themselves with language to be able to express themselves through a more universal, highly interactive method. The majority of each 1.5-2 hour session consists of music therapy as well as socialization before and after the sessions, which help the therapy flourish as a successful tool for both interaction and expression. Specific examples of musical activities include sing-alongs, rhythmic activities involving drums, musical group games, dancing, etc. At our therapy sessions, we work with 1-on-1 pairings that provide each child attendee with a trained youth volunteer who can form an emotional connection with them throughout the duration of the program. In this way, care and attention is catered uniquely to each child. Throughout the ten week semester, the children begin leaving their own comfort zone and start to open up more to others around them, with music or art as the main tool for socialization. Not only does this allow us to quickly adapt to best accommodate the children's needs, but volunteers are able to gain more experience and serve as positive role models to these children. Children with disabilities are full of potentials, and often all they need is a chance, and they can live up to their full potential!

3. Describe how this project/event/program will benefit residents of Burnaby (who will benefit). How many Burnaby residents will be involved with or benefit from the project?

Our therapy programs will benefit the residents of Burnaby in many ways; first and foremost, setting up a program in Burnaby will allow for increased accessibility to possible participants and families who are residents of Burnaby. A program oriented for children with disabilities in Burnaby will also promote a strong sense of community and togetherness, as it shows that the Burnaby Council cares for and strives to help children with disabilities, giving these families a sense of support. The number of Burnaby residents that will be involved is roughly around 800, including families, volunteers, youth, and the general community.

According to the City of Burnaby's Official Community Plan, working with government departments and non-profit agencies in needs identification and service planning is key in Human Services planning. We believe that our organization aligns with Burnaby's views because we are a non profit charity organization that helps children and youth with disabilities. Supporting our Building Bridges with Music and Education (and other therapy programs), the City of Burnaby

will be able to accomplish a key goal in Human Services Planning and increase community involvement for children with disabilities and their families.

If the amount requested from the City of Burnaby is not fully granted, there are various possibilities that may take place. Firstly, more fundraising activity from our activists and volunteers will be needed to make up for the lack of funding in order to continue running our programs. This may be in the form of bake sales and donation drives. Secondly, our programs may need to be run on a smaller scale than what SDC wishes for. We may need to provide less sessions, in fewer locations, in order to cut back on costs. Another possibility is that we may need to charge our participants more to offset our costs, unfortunately decreasing the accessibility of our programs. These various outcomes would limit community accessibility as well as participation.

## E. EVENT OUTCOMES\*

1. How will you know if your project/event/program reached its goals? (for example, a goal of engaging youth in environmental activities might include reaching a set target of youth participants)

We will know we have reached our goal if we are able to open 16 Building Bridges with Music programs in the Burnaby area, in which we aim to enroll 160 children with disabilities (along with 160 youth volunteers/buddies). We will also gauge our success by using post-program surveys; if we are able to reach a 90% rate of overall positive responses, we will judge our program as having been successful. Our ability to secure future funding to continue our events will also help us measure our success.

2. What data and feedback do you collect from your audience/participants? How do you evaluate your programs and services?

We collect post-program feedback from parents, music and art coordinators, volunteers, and program coordinators through feedback forms. We focus on talking to those who have seen the program run firsthand and were present on a consistent basis. By collecting accounts and responses from these parties, we are able to accurately judge the reception and effect of our programs on the participants who attend.

Currently, SDC is pursuing various sources of funding. Government funding, fundraisers, corporate sponsorships, corporate grants, charitable grants and private donations. SDC has a plan for diversification, but the primary objective is to increase our amounts received on all fronts. We plan to increase our number of applications for government funding and increase our amount requested. Through our youth hiring and furthered ability to work with more youth, we plan to host more fundraisers to increase our amount fundraised yearly. After a decade of work, SDC plans to further connect with more corporations in BC to pursue long lasting sponsorships through partnerships and community involvement. Finally, for corporate and charitable grants, we plan to increase the number of applications as well as the amount requested. This is our plan to increase diversification of our funding and ensure longevity.

Program Expansion

Description:

We plan to accomplish this through a series of personal development, professional development, and disability justice workshops for youth. By increasing our involvement in communities outside Metro Vancouver, we hope to reach more youth audiences and raise awareness as well as support.

Lastly, we plan to diversify our program types by also collaborating with other organizations. Outside of art and music therapy, we hope to increase the types of programs that SDC provides by working together with organizations such as Variety, The Children's Charity of BC. Some examples of joint programs that are possible include cooking and pottery classes.

We also offer scholarships to children with disabilities from low-income families.
