At approximately, 10:15 p.m. last night, we experienced an electrical power outage from an external source. This resulted

in the shutdown of multiple parts of the refinery and

an elevated flare. The flare is a safe and immediate process that ensures we can safely stabilize the refinery after a disruption and an important part of the safe and reliable operations at the Refinery. There was no fire at the Refinery

and there was no impact or risk to the employees or

community.








• To Date 12 Month Distribution

2020 Distribution


Fire Incidents: 32%

• As the density of the City increases the number of multi-unit residential and commercial buildings, the firefighting resources required to attack fires within larger, more complex buildings with more lives present also increases. This leads to an increase in 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Alarm fire incidents annually.





- Fires in outdoor spaces typically increase during the summer months of the year.
- The drying effects of climate change on City wildland spaces has been notable.
- The dry wildland season now begins early in April and extends to October, a six month period.


### Description:

- When a fire alarm is inadvertently activated

### False Alarm:


- When a person deliberately reports a non-existent fire or emergency
- When a person deliberately activates an alarm system knowing that there is no fire or emergency



• The reduction in incidents from 2020 Apr → Sep was related to BC Emergency Health Services altering the motor vehicle accident deployment models of the fire service during COVID-19 pandemic in order to sustain critical PPE needs of the Health Care Sector. During this initial period of the pandemic, the fire service was utilized only for high-mechanism of injury accidents where patients were more likely to be in need of Fire Department Heavy Rescue operations.


Motor Vehicle Accidents with or without injuries.



 The reduction in incidents through 2020 and into 2021 was related to BC Emergency Health Services altering the medical emergency deployment models of the fire service during COVID-19 pandemic in order to sustain critical PPE needs of the Health Care Sector. These calls are being back for Fire Department response at an increasing rate.
