The Burnaby Fire Department is the third-largest fire department in British Columbia, with 315 employees serving a population of 261,955¹ and protecting 98.6 km². The City of Burnaby includes four (4) major quadrants, each consisting of a dense town centre area, high and low-density residential, large commercial and industrial business districts, and significant dedicated parkland and green spaces.

The Department is made up of five (5) divisions, each staffed with highly trained and extremely motivated members focused on protecting our city. Each division within the Department is critical to our collective success. These divisions include:

- » our dedication to improving the safety and quality of life of the City's residents and visitors







BURNABY FIREFIGHTERS' CHARITABLE SOCIETY

The Burnaby Firefighters Charitable Society is supported by over 300 dedicated members who raise money for the community and non-profit organizations. The constant dedication from our membership allows us to help people in our community every day by volunteering our time to assist those in need.

Covid-19 has been very challenging and once again, our members made it a priority to help the less fortunate to improve their quality of life. The Burnaby Firefighters volunteered over 7,000 hours across 50 initiatives, with many aimed at helping those impacted by the pandemic. We delivered food donations from the Greater Vancouver Food Bank to various community support hubs throughout our city twice a week. We are very fortunate to work with such a community-based, family-focused team of community leaders who ensure food is at the forefront.

We know that protecting a community is not just about keeping lives and property safe but also helping people in need daily, especially those dealing with health problems, disabilities, poverty, abuse, hunger, and other challenges. The Burnaby Firefighters Charitable Society raises funds to provide sizeable donations to many charitable and community organizations. We support Burnaby-based charities and other organizations in the Lower Mainland needing assistance. Due to the pandemic, we have only been able to have one fundraiser in the last 2½ years, which was our 2021 golf tournament.

We are very fortunate that Marilyn and Alan Codyre trusted and respected us enough to leave us their estate to assist people during these difficult times.

We raised a record total of \$60,407.25 in the 2021 Boot Drive for Muscular Dystrophy. With over 50 locations throughout the community, it took the hard work and dedication from everyone involved for the drive to be as successful as it was.

In 2021, the Burnaby Firefighters Charitable Society took over the Sapperton Fish & Game Club Hatchery operations. Our members contributed over 500 volunteer hours and helped raise and release 8,500 Coho and 18,300 Chum Salmon into the local waterways. As Covid-19 restrictions ease, we will partner with local elementary schools to help raise the fry and educate students on the value of conserving our local fish stocks.
