1. MAJOR INCIDENTS

Detail:	 Substantial increase in the public's need for emergency medical aid The heightened demand for emergency medical service significantly exceeded the available resources across the Metro Vancouver region Increase in reported cardiac emergencies and sudden deaths EComm 911 Emergency Call network was overwhelmed by call volume creating long call answering wait times BC Ambulance Services was overwhelmed with calls for medical aid response and care
Future Impacts:	 Projected increase in both frequency and magnitude of regional mass emergency events. Including the effects of: Global climate change The COVID-19 pandemic The opioid & mental health crisis Unhoused populations Diminishing financial resiliency due to the regional increased cost of living In order to care for and provide for the needs of its citizens during regional emergency events, such as experienced during the heat dome event of June 2021, there exists strong evidence to suggest a growing need for the City of Burnaby to prepare to be self-reliant, to the greatest extent possible, with regard to emergency call taking, dispatching, medical and fire response.






2.1 Suppression Division Statistics





Interpretation:

- In July of 2021 BC Emergency Health Services committed to re-establishing the full use of the Fire Service in pre-hospital care medical responses. This change back to pre-COVID19 protocols is expected to correct the 2020 downturn in total incident responses.
- 2020 Total Incidents: 9,124 -30%
 2019 Total Incidents: 12,929 -5%
 2018 Total Incidents: 13,585 -13%
 2017 Total Incidents: 15,550 +10%
- 2016 Total Incidents: 14,028 +9%










- Fires in outdoor spaces typically increase during the summer months of the year.
- The drying effects of climate change on City wildland spaces has been notable.
- The dry wildland season now begins early in April and extends to October, a six month period.

Description:

• Fires related to outdoor spaces and lands.



Interpretation:

• It is expected that with the increasing density of living within the City, and the increase in buildings required to utilize automatic fire detection systems that the number of False & Accidental Alarm incidents will consistently and continually increase.


Description:

Accidental Alarm:

- When there is a malfunction in a fire alarm system
- When a fire alarm is inadvertently activated

False Alarm:

- When a person deliberately reports a non-existent fire or emergency
- When a person deliberately activates an alarm system knowing that there is no fire or emergency





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Description:

• Motor Vehicle Accidents with or without injuries.





Interpretation:

• Within Burnaby, the trailing 3 months in 2021 has seen a very slight reduction in the overdose event attended by the Fire Department compared to the spring months of 2021.

Conclusion

In addition to the information within this report, the Fire Department would like to communicate the following issues for consideration by the Public Safety Committee:

- Through the summer season, the Department had been maintained in a heightened state of readiness based on the increased risk of structure and wildland fire events due to the extreme heat and drying conditions present within our city and the province. There was significant concern that during the summer month's dry trends within forest spaces across the province presents an increased risk of wildland fire to forested areas, parks spaces and residential homes in close proximity to these green spaces. The Burnaby Mountain Conservation Area by its nature as a pristine environmental space is at high risk of wildfire caused by limited opportunities to provide fuel management activities, the general drying of the forest due to regional weather change, and increased human use and interactions.
- The provincial state of emergency related to the wildfires, was a concern and proved taxing across the fire service. As a result of significant weather changes in late August, the risk to the province from wildfire events was dramatically reduced.
- Within Burnaby, the trailing 3 months in 2021 has seen a very slight reduction in the overdose event attended by the Fire Department compared to the spring months of 2021. However, these statistics are still very concerning.
