







PROPOSAL RE: ODLUM BROWN VANOPEN AUGUST 12 -19, 2023

The Odlum Brown VanOpen is pleased to present this proposal to the City of Burnaby with the request to use parts of the Burnaby Sports Complex for the upcoming 2023 and 2024 editions of this professional tennis tournament. The VanOpen tournament is a combined men's and women's event and on the world circuits of the ATP Challenger 125 and WTA 125 levels. Our tournament website is www.vanopen.com and please check out our 2022 highlight video.

The following outlines the event dates, set up and tear down dates subject to supplier approval, proposed locations and intended use at those locations. Transportation, food and beverage, first aid, security and parking is also discussed.

We are also looking to the City of Burnaby, Sport Burnaby and Tourism Burnaby to come together as a financial and operations partner in this endeavour to bring this level of tournament to the City of Burnaby. To make a move to the Burnaby Sports Complex we are faced with new expenses we have not faced before in infrastructure and manpower costs. From setup and teardown event support to positions like a hotel coordinator and a food & beverage manager there are many tournament positions for us to fill and great event experience opportunities for your staff to jump into for us.

The leadership team at the Odlum Brown VanOpen is excited about the opportunity to work with your teams in bringing this high level tennis event to Burnaby. As an attachment to this proposal we have provided a digital version of our Summary Report from the 2022 Odlum Brown VanOpen so you can get a sense of the event feel and the type of earned media coverage we receive. In previous years, The Odlum Brown VanOpen has attracted former World number 1 tennis players, and future star of Canadian tennis, and believe this will continue.

Odlum Brown VanOpen event dates: August 12 -19, 2023 Players and officials start arriving from Wed, August 9th onward.

Burnaby Tennis Club:

• The Odlum Brown VanOpen would need to take over all 17 courts from Thursday August 10th- Saturday, August 19th with rolling court closures based on the stadium build out timeline. All stands would need to be completed by Friday, August 4th. Please note the August long weekend falls August 5, 6, 7 and will keep as many courts open as possible leading up to the tournament. Full set up is needed to be complete and courts ready for players by Thursday, Aug 10th.

Request for court resurfacing and post height adjustment:

The Governing bodies of the Men's and Women's tour require that all official tournament matches be played on the same playing surface. Resurfacing of the proposed match courts (Courts 6-11 and 12-17) is requested to ensure that all match courts play equally. The Odlum Brown VanOpen will be requesting exemptions from the WTA and ATP on the actual court size,















as on the majority of the courts, the distances from the baseline of the court to the back fencing are not long enough and not to official International court size regulations.

Courts 12 -17, that are currently under the bubble, only have the court playing surface applied from the baseline till 19 feet. (International regulations require a minimum of 21 feet, and ideally 27 feet for a stadium court). There is more court space available between the green playing surface and the fence, however, this is bare concrete and not a playing surface. If the additional concrete space were to be finished (resurfaced) and extended to the fence line this will allow for courts 12-17 to meet the criteria needed for court size.

One final consideration is that the regulation net post height is 3 feet 6 inches. The net post heights are fine on courts 1-11, however on courts 12-17, the net post heights for these courts are 3 feet 3 inches. A request would be made to increase this height by filling in the hole made of the net posts by 3 inches to increase the net post height.

In order for the public to access the proposed match court 8 for viewing, and without interrupting the matches, we would require a gate be cut into the fence on the South side of court 7 for access.

Overall Court Size Deficiencies:

- Courts 12-17 distance between the baseline and green covered surface area ending is 19 feet and not 21 feet, as required, and 26 feet as preferred for Stadium courts.
- Courts 12-17 netpost height is 39 inches and not 42 inches.
- Courts 6-11 on the South side are between 3 and 6 inches too short from the baseline to the nearest obstruction, the fence, and an exemption from ATP and WTA governing bodies will be requested.
- Courts 1-5 on the South side are between 7 inches and 12 inches too short from the baseline to the nearest obstruction (the fence). This will be used as practice courts for the players, and no exemption will be needed for practice courts.

Attached is a page from the ATP Tennis Rule book for court size.

We have also noticed some trees inside the club grounds that could use some trimming which would open up a bit of space for the public waiting to get into matches. In addition the tree on the south east corner of Sprott Street and Kensington Ave would need to be trimmed back to make accessing the crosswalk safer. We would like the City of Burnaby to consider upgrades to the pedestrian access from the Burnaby Tennis Club entrance to that corner for safer crossing.

B. ON-SITE FACILITES

Each Challenger tournament must provide facilities as specified below

- ✓ Match and Practice Courts with equipment and supplies
- ✓ Players' Locker Room
- ✓ Players' Lounge
- ✓ Gym or Warm-up/Cool-down area
- ✓ Physiotherapist/Treatment Room
- ✓ Offices for ATP Supervisor and other officials
- ✓ Office for Live Streaming personnel
- ✓ Anti-Doping Facilities (if required)

15. COURT

a) Court Dimensions

- All courts must comply with specifications as per the Rules of Tennis and ATP Rulebook
- Match Courts shall be minimum 60 feet (18.29 meters) wide and 120 feet (36.58 meters) long, with minimum distances of:
 - 21 feet (6.40 meters) between the baseline and backstop
 - 12 feet (3.66 m) between the doubles sideline and sidestop

at each side (see diagram below)

- Center court shall be minimum **66 feet (20.11 meters) wide** and **132 feet (40.23 meters) long**, with minimum distances of:
 - 27 feet (8.23 m) between the baseline and backstop
 - 15 feet (4.57 meters) between the doubles sideline and sidestop

at each side (see diagram below)

- The net posts shall be 3 ½ feet (1.07 m) hight, not more than 6 inches (15 cm) square or in diameter with the centres of the net posts positioned 3 feet (0.914 m) outside the court on each side. The net post (and singles sticks if used) shall not be more than 1 inch (2.5 cm) above the top of the net cord. (see diagram below)
- If a doubles net is used for singles matches, then two (2) single sticks 3 ½ feet (1.07 m) high and not more 3 inches (7.5 cm) square or in diameter, will be used with their centres positioned 3 feet (0.914 m) outside the singles court on each side (see diagram below)
- Courts shall be laid out with the long axis north and south; however, geographic
 considerations may modify this orientation in order to minimize the adverse effect of serving
 into the sun
- Outdoor court surfaces shall be classified as (a) hard; (b) clay; or (c) grass.
- Indoor surfaces shall be classified as Indoor Hard and shall be constructed using an acrylic or similar surface paint applied on a hard or semi-hard base.
- Clay, composition and loose surface courts shall be swept and lines cleaned before the start of all matches and properly maintained
- Any court surface or change in a tournament's court surface must be requested in writing to and approved by ATP.
- ATP reserves the right to restrict the colour of an indoor synthetic court as well as outdoor surfaces. The lines of the court shall be white.


















Field #1 Grass Rugby Field & fencing

WIFI:

We understand that we would need an IT provider to set up internet and dedicated routers for the livestreaming team at the tennis club and at the Rugby Clubhouse for player access and tournament operations. This would be a great place for the IT department with the City of Burnaby to help arrange some temporary dedicated internet.















Security:

We typically have Securiguard as a security partner to support us with some key locations at the tournament and for overnight security of the site. We would engage with them for their service. This could also be an opportunity for Burnaby to support the tournament if there is already overnight security provided nearby booked with the City of Burnaby.

Fencing:

We will likely need to fence around the entire Burnaby Tennis Club to create a secure venue. We would also like to fence the tenting on the Rugby Field as well but this will be based on the final setup once we understand who and where the food and beverage provider will be.

Foot Bridge: We would like to request a foot bridge be built by Burnaby over the ditch so that access to the tennis courts will be safer and we would have a traffic control volunteer to ensure guests are crossing safely.

Medical coverage for the public: We would have a 10x10 medical tent onsite for any public needs. We hope that with the swimming pool down across the road those lifeguards who have emergency first aid training might want to work the tournament. This could be another way for the City of Burnaby to help us. Over the years we have been very lucky with only 1 or 2 episodes of head exhaustion experienced by members of the public that were sitting in the sun too long. We want to ensure there is a place in the shade for such guests to lay down and recover or rest until additional medical personnel arrive.

Insurance: We have general liability event insurance through ATP and WTA and can provide those certificates as needed.

Construction:

We are aware of the construction happening directly across the street from the Burnaby Tennis Club and out in front of the Burnaby Lake Rugby Club. We know construction can be extremely loud but we hope that we could avoid really loud repetitive noises during our tournament like pile driving. It is very important that Sprott Street east of Kensington does not become blocked, inhibiting access to the both Rugby Clubhouse or to the gravel lot during our tournament. A request for a traffic control person to manage construction traffic is in place which they typically would be outside the construction site.

Maintenance staff:

















We are hoping to engage the City of Burnaby for maintenance staff support during the event. More frequent washroom checks and adding our rented toilets to the cleaning stops a few times a day – we do get all onsite portable toilets serviced every morning but hoping to use Burnaby staff to support cleaning and restocking. In addition, we hope the City of Burnaby can assist with garbage and recycling collection throughout the event.

Transportation and parking:

The Odlum Brown VanOpen is responsible for getting the players from the airport to the hotels and the venue. We will be having shuttles coming to and from the hotel to the site by coming east down Sprott Street into the parking lot by the Rugby Clubhouse and drop players, coaches and officials. Those with tournament accreditation will be able to get on and off the shuttles. The shuttle will then drive north down the parking lot and out to Joe Sakic Way.

We will either do golf cart shuttles taking players from the Rugby Clubhouse (Players' Lounge) to Christine Sinclair Centre or a Sprinter van for those who do not want to walk to access the player change rooms and player gym. This would have players avoid the busy intersection that the WTA is a little concerned about. Players would have the option to walk directly to Sinclair Centre but it's a good idea for us to have a shuttle as well. Regardless we would have a volunteer traffic control person supporting the crosswalk on the corner of Kensington and Sprott Street and at Sprott Street & Sperling. It would be great if an overpass could be built across Kensington to avoid potential traffic issues and provide safety to the pedestrians.

It's fantastic that the Burnaby Sports Complex is so close to a skytrain stop and that there are regular buses every 10 minutes leaving Metrotown Mall to our venue. This will really be great for spectators.

For parking we will use the all-weather field #10, parking next to Rugby Clubhouse and will be reaching out to the Ismaili Jamatkhana and the Scandinavian Community Centre to see if additional parking can be used for spectators. We will be pushing the public to take transit and offer a shuttle to the skytrain station when available.






































Event Safety Plan:

Benefits to the City of Burnaby:

We are looking for a partnership with the City of Burnaby as mentioned at the beginning of this proposal. There are a host of positive benefits the Odlum Brown VanOpen would bring to Burnaby. The economic impact to the City of Burnaby is substantial. With over 600 room nights needed by the tournament for players, coaches, player entourage and officials your nearby hotels will feel the lift. This trickles down to the restaurants and shops in and around the hotels that our VanOpen guests are staying in. For those players traveling with their family your local historical attractions and parks will be visited as well and likely shared on social media around the whole world.

The food and beverage revenue opportunity at our event is substantial as we have a base of tournament groups who are guaranteed meals from the tournament and business from the spectators who often spend long days at our tournament enjoying the high level of tennis we have to offer. At the Burnaby Tennis Club we have the ability to build more seating than were we able to do at our previous venue and with this centrally located venue we believe we will draw more general admission ticket holders than ever before.

This is a professional tennis event on the WTA (Women's Tennis Association) and ATP (Association of Tennis Professionals) tours. It is the largest combined (men & women) professional tennis event in Western Canada and the Pacific Northwest. There is definite prestige in being a partner of this event and it would be great profile for the City of Burnaby. We have an extensive communications campaign using print, digital and social channels in the lead up to Odlum Brown VanOpen and it would be big news that Burnaby is hosting the tournament! We already have had the media reach out to us asking if we have any news so

















they can write a story — we've asked them to just wait a little longer as we are working on it;) The earned media our event gets through our daily media releases and just being part of a newsworthy sporting event in the summer is fantastic. We would be promoting the City of Burnaby as our new venue partner and the media will be all over it. We would be happy to work with the communications department at the City of Burnaby.

Our venue being in your city will bring an international eye onto Burnaby. All our main draw matches are live streamed so we can keep in touch with tennis fans all around the world. We would have sidewall banners on Centre Court created for the City of Burnaby, logo on our website, big box ad on the VanOpen website, host venue homepage visibility on our website, and further onsite branding and hosting opportunities that we would like to discuss further including a City of Burnaby box (seats 4) on Centre Court.

With the future Pacific Tennis Centre, the proposed tennis and racquet sports facility, right next door to the Burnaby Tennis Club this event will bring high profile influential eyes on the location and potential funding partners for the development.

A huge thank you for considering this proposal to bring professional tennis to your community. We are aware of the tight timelines we are on to make this happen for 2023 and feel strongly that with the support of the City of Burnaby we can make it happen. We look forward to speaking further about what this partnership with the City of Burnaby and Sport Burnaby could look like.

We are pleased to report that the 2022 Odlum Brown VanOpen was a tremendous success! Western Canada's #1 tennis tournament saw record crowds and the best field of play in the history of the event.

As Tournament Chair and Tournament Director, we were thrilled with the results of this year's tournament. We were very excited this year to be able to raise the level of play by moving up to a WTA 125 on the women's side and an ATP Challenger 125 on the men's side. After a two year hiatus, the tennis community here in Vancouver was ready to welcome back these international professional tennis players with incredible hospitality and enthusiastic crowds.
