





2.1 Suppression Division Statistics








- As the density of the City increases the number of multi-unit residential and commercial buildings, the firefighting resources required to attack fires within larger, more complex buildings with more lives present also increases. This leads to an increase in 2nd and 3rd alarm fire incidents annually.
- Increase in fire events typically experienced through holiday season and within winter months




- Fire related to all types of vehicles and mobile equipment:

- Fires in outdoor spaces typically increase during the summer months of the year.
- The drying effects of climate change on City wildland spaces has been notable.
- The dry wildland season now begins early in April and extends to October, a six month period.


Description:

False Alarm:


- When a person deliberately reports a non-existent fire or emergency








2.3 Training Division Programs

Training – Activities

Activities and completed training initiatives

Training Division Planning

 Investigate and develop proposal for Training Division staffing to assist in recruiting and retaining Training Division personnel; discuss a minimum staffing over extended absences

Fire Officer 1:

- FO1 ESM course Oct 26-30 (18 candidates); newer FO instructors inserted into course as many senior instructors will be in the FO3 course next training block
- Development of detailed FO1 course in anticipation of entire Training Division change over in 2025 (fine-tuned by ACTO Edgecombe during fall Training Block as course progressed).
- Completion of single 2023 FO1 candidate preceptorship (delayed due to MTD injury); Live Fire component to be completed Nov 20.
- 1104 personnel hours
- Sims-U-share test scenarios to be developed

Fire Officer 2:

 Completed FO2 programming re-development: detailed 5 day lesson plan programming completed for 2025 FO2 (with diminished senior instructor participation due to FO3 course)

First Responder/EMR:

- Departmental personnel completed practical component for Provincially mandated FR/EMR scope of practice update
- Online written component for Scope of Practice update still in progress; AFC have been getting shift personnel to complete this section
- Catch-up on missing on-shift personnel due to sickness or injury for practical scope of practice update.

Rescue Task Force Medic:

- In response to a request from RCMP to address the need for adequate medical response during ADT emergencies, we have developed a program (still ongoing)
- Shift wide awareness training took place online in September
- FR Coordinator (Ryan Ward) and RTF-Medic Facilitator (Mike Franks) ran the shift leads through a practical training component with RCMP Medic Program lead, Dr. Vu.

- Shift leads ran the on-duty personnel through a practical awareness session in preparation for the operations nights
- Captain Mike Franks ran all participants in the practical operations training through enhanced medical training the day of each session
- Practical Training sessions commenced with RCMP Tactical units October 6, 7, 10, 11 (17:00 – 01:00 hrs); each session consisted of a training component followed by 2 complete live scenarios
- 75 members trained with a total of **656 personnel hours** for the night scenarios
- On-shift training hours in preparation totaled 897 hours
