





2.1 Suppression Division Statistics








- As the density of the City increases the number of multi-unit residential and commercial buildings, the firefighting resources required to attack fires within larger, more complex buildings with more lives present also increases. This leads to an increase in 2nd and 3rd alarm fire incidents annually.
- Increase in fire events typically experienced through holiday season and within winter months





- The drying effects of climate change on City wildland spaces has been notable.
- The dry wildland season now begins early in April and extends to October, a six month period.


Description:

False Alarm:


- When a person deliberately reports a non-existent fire or emergency








Activities and completed training initiatives

Training Division Planning

- Development of plan to provide FR training over quarterly basis on shift
- Planning for new staffing beginning Dec 30.

Fire Officer 1:

- FO1 ESM table-top exam preparation: some newer FO instructors inserted into course to facilitate their instructional experience continued to work with 16 candidates for 6 shifts following the training block
 - Candidates: 384 hours; Instructors: 120 hours
- Development of new FO1 test bank scenarios on SimsUshare.
- 7 practical scenarios conducted by Training Division for top FO1 seniority group.

 On-going refinement of FO2 programming re-development: detailed 5-day lesson plan programming completed for 2025 FO2 (with diminished senior instructor participation due to FO3 course)

- Catch-up on missing on-shift personnel due to sickness or injury for practical scope of practice update.
- 4 FR recertification exams 8 hours

Rescue Task Force Medic:

- On-duty personnel ran through practical awareness sessions in preparation for the operations nights (Nov 1, 2, 21and 30).
- Capt. Mike Franks ran all participants in the practical operations training through enhanced medical training the day of each session
